We have also seen people give their time helping one another in our communities and prioritising the needs of our young people. We could not engage with so many young people without the ongoing support of our communities.



## CHAIR PERSON'S ANNUAL REPORT - RACHAEL GREEN

2021

As a board, we met five times in 2021, including our annual staff planning day. At our planning day, we spent time as a team discussing the year using the Matariki model; māharatia (reflect), whakanuia (celebrate) and wawatatia (aspire). This was a great model and fits well with the ethos of Cross Over Trust.

We continue to aim towards our Vision 'Thriving Woven Communities' and our mission 'Growing resilient children and youth of character'.

As we strive to meet the needs of our tamariki and rangitahi, we are grateful for those who are supporting us. Our funders, supporters, community groups, ministries from South West Baptist Church and volunteers are an essential part of the journey in caring for and empowering our young people and communities. We know the importance of those supporting Cross Over trust and, most importantly, our tamariki and rangatahi and we recognise the commitment, efforts, passion and time from our supporters.

Our staff have worked hard to prepare and adapt their work, ensuring we continue to look out for our young people. Although this may look slightly different, we continue to keep young people at the heart of our work. We are committed to strengthening communities and seeing our young people connect and find belonging in their local communities. With our strategic plan reviewed and in place, we are looking forward to the plans and vision of 2022 to serve and empower our young people.

2021 was another challenging year regarding the Covid-19 pandemic. Our communities have worked together to care for our young people, and we are grateful for their wide network of support. Everyone has been affected differently; please see our Covid-19 response section later in this report.

In 2021 we saw our communities thrive and look after one another. Activities included a skateboarding club in Addington Te Kura Taumatua lunchtimes, communities celebrating and learning about Matariki, surf lessons for tamariki from the Rowley community and Te Ara Koropiko West Spreydon getting the coffee cart up and running again! Origin Sport ran holiday programmes and sports weeks and started up a local Ki O Rahi and TAG tournament! We have seen great projects form in our local communities this year!

Te Ara Koropiko moved back to their school site on Lyttleton Street. The building works are all done, and the tamariki are settling back in. This is a long process, but it is great to be back at the Lyttleton Street school site and utilise the new facilities. A highlight was the mihi whakatau held to welcome everyone back to the school site, where we came together to celebrate, play games and share food. Our SCL and support staff have run many activities and projects like running club and new parents' mornings. It has been great to see the tamariki play and engage in activities, including a lunchtime Lego club!

Rowley community painted the entire fence that boundaries Te Komanawa Rowley School in 2021. Both tamariki and whanau worked together, and after 160 Litres of paint and teamwork, the fence was complete! At the end of the year, students planted fruit trees around Te Komanawa Rowley School. The students said they would enjoy eating the fruit more than planting the trees but with all this effort from students, the school is looking great, and many students will eat fruit from those trees in years to come.

## MANAGERS ANNUAL REPORT - ROY KENNEALLY, MANAGER

2021

Our SCL at Addington Te Kura Taumatua focused primarily on pastoral care in 2021. Our SCL has been a helping hand and a listening ear for those needing support throughout the year. The School principal, Donna Buchanan, began the year with a staff retreat to Hamner and worked on the school strategic plan, which includes community involvement.

Addington Te Kura Taumatua had a 'week of kindness', which was great to see so many students show an act of kindness to someone they know. Through the challenges that 2021 has brought, the community has worked together, and we are grateful for all the volunteers who look after our young people.

We have focused on engaging young people in physical activities and being active through play. Many tamariki and rangitahi entered sporting tournaments, including our TAG tournament that began at the end of 2021. Origin Sport has been present in our three local schools during lunchtimes and after school, engaging tamariki in sport. Cross Over Trust is constantly working to remove barriers so that all young people have equal opportunities to participate.

We have consciously celebrated well with staff, volunteers and most importantly, our young people in 2021. We have a farewell and welcoming staff, we had had community gatherings when we were able to, and we focused on what young people want to happen in their local community.

Many of our staff took part in study throughout the year. We were so pleased to see our interns completing their bachelor of Youth Work Development (please see 'Interns' Section). One staff member studied community development, and others learned Te Reo Maori.

We want to say a huge thank you to everyone in our communities.

Despite the challenging year, we have seen some positive things in our three local neighbourhoods. The support for our young people is important, and it is good to see so many people working to care for them!



Our staff in 2021 has been a great team working towards the shared vision of bettering the lives of our young people. We are grateful for our team, who work immensely hard and serve locally in their community.

## ORIGIN SPORT

Origin Sport had 32,000 tamariki and rangitahi participations in 2021, just 1190 less than 2020. We predicted that our numbers would have significantly decreased due to the Covid-19 guidelines and restrictions. However, Origin Sport still reached 32,000 children in our communities and engaged them in sport and play.

Fewer events took place on a more regular basis, including the Tag and Kī-o-Rahi module that ran for 12-weeks and our usual 14-week touch module. We had almost the same number of volunteers but the hours volunteered to Origin Sport have gone from 505 hours to 848 hours. We were pleased to see our volunteer culture thrive this year. Our adult participation went from 40-to 432 highly due to our Kī-o-Rahi and Tag module being for rangitahi and pakeke.

# Our Data-2021

## The Primary Project

We decreased how many children we reached in 2021 as opportunities to gather were more limited due to the pandemic. We were unable to have the Hoon Hay fiesta, Pacific Series and many other events due to gathering restrictions, but we adapted the way we worked to gather in smaller groups.

We reached 4443 tamariki and rangitahi and had high attendance in projects including breakfast club and coffee morning, 120 tamariki gathering in school for hangi and the end of year celebrations held at school.

We had 11 fewer volunteers in 2021 than in 2020, although we were happy to see volunteer hours went from 2013 to 3276! Volunteers in our local communities dedicated more time to help with projects and activities to benefit our young people.

210 hours were volunteered to paint the Te Komanawa Rowley School fence spread across 70 volunteers. Our Addington Te Kura Taumatua School ESPs volunteered over 100 hours of their time and more than 160 hours on the Te Ara Koro Piko Wes Spreydon school pool and school hall working bee!



# ROWLEY COMMUNITY

We focused on implementing structures for students to feel settled in term one. Having projects and activities running gave whanau and tamariki the chance to feel connected in their local community. Rowley tamariki have had opportunities each end of the summer season to participate in 'Have a Go' surfing days. A group of tamariki and our staff, interns and volunteers, go out to the beach as a group, to learn to surf! As a part of the surf trips, we teach beach and water safety to the tamariki. This has been a fantastic project for our young people. Many children learnt surfing for the first time, and almost everyone caught a wave! At the end of term two, Te Komanawa Rowley had a hangi to celebrate the end of the term. We celebrated Matariki as well as what students had learned through the term. The hangi was an excellent time to share food and connect. In May 2021, 30 young people had the opportunity to attend Easter Camp. Our staff and volunteers went alongside these young people and feedback on how everyone had a great time. Rowley took home the volleyball championships after a great competition!

Our young people missed Easter camp 2020 due to the pandemic but attending in 2021 was a great space to grow and strengthen relationships and spend time with one another. In term four, we managed to have a disco at the school with DJ Professa attending online due to the Covid-19 restrictions at the time. Rowley has been creative in finding ways to still be together as a community during these uncertain times of Covid-19. At the end of 2021, we installed a basketball hoop in the Rowley community located at the end of a cul-de-sac. Tamariki, who lived on the street, got permission and 100% support from residents. As the hoop was being installed, more and more people gathered to help. We celebrated with food and played basketball together! It has been great to see young people playing basketball in the local street over the summer and enjoy time with each other; We are excited for what 2022 holds for the Rowley community!

To Whom it May Concern,

We are a small Decile 1 school in Hoon Hay that has been through a lot over the past few years. We are currently in the process of making our school a great place for our children to be again. We want them to have pride in their school and their community and be proud of where they come from.

As part of this, we have been working with the Cross Over Trust to provide opportunities for our children. The Cross Over Trust has supported us by providing programmes at break times to ensure children are active, assisting with transport for children to attend learning experiences, setting up workshops like bike repairs and getting children involved in new sports like surfing.

The services that the Cross Over Trust provide has meant we now have significantly fewer 'incidents' at break times as the children are actively engaged in an activity. We have children playing new sports, one young girl has even gone on to a higher level playing Volleyball after being introduced to it during one of the Cross Over Trusts sessions.

Without the support of the Cross Over Trust, we would struggle to provide our children with the extra's that they get and we know we cannot afford to do this and the families cannot afford to support their children with these extra-curricula activities.

Students spent hours practising to perform their school performance 'Shrek' the musical. A lot of work went into all aspects of the show, and it was a huge success! Great effort to everyone who took part! We have been developing ideas for our school playground, and it is almost ready to open. Our tamariki bought their ideas together to decide what their dream playground would look like. We're excited to have a safe place for our community to play in Addington.

The proposed changes to Brougham Street have been an issue that has galvanised lots of different community groups. The community have had the opportunity to share their ideas through meetings and writing submissions. Another highlight was our students and whānau being hosted by Hillmorton High School for a Noho Marae stay during Matariki. Addington Te Kura Taumatua ended the year with a school Christmas party; although we could not run the event for the whole community as we usually do, the kids still had a lot of fun. It was a very joyful way to finish what has been a challenging year. We are looking forward to 2022 and seeing our tamariki thrive in their communities and we are thankful for the community spirit of everyone supporting one another!

# WEST SPREYDON COMMUNITY

Te ara koropiko West Spreydon moved back to our permanent school site on Lyttelton Street in 2021, and it is great to be back! We are thankful for all the hard work we have seen from our community working to make the school an excellent space for our tamariki! We have seen volunteers take part in working bees to get everything unpacked and settled for the students, and teachers and staff have gone above and beyond to make the space welcoming for tamariki and whanau. The coffee cart has been running when we have had the opportunity (while following restrictions and guidelines) and it has been a gathering space to meet and connect with whanau. Tamariki have been playing lunchtime games, gutter ball and four square, and there has even been a running club to be part of, before and after school. We are pleased to see so many children engaged and enjoying their time during lunch and after school. Netball was a highlight in term two; we saw tamariki develop their skills and have fun playing as a team. Netball has been a place of connection for those who take part, and we have seen children develop foundation skills in the sport. The journey of the school pool has been a long journey; after being damaged from the 2011 earthquakes, we have seen volunteers dedicate many hours over the years, working collaboratively to get the pool to a standard that the community can use and enjoy! We are almost at the stage of opening the pool and are excited for it to be a place of community engagement and connection!

Getting the pool to the stage, it is now, was only possible because of our community's commitment! Thank you to all those who made this project come together!

We also had a drive to reinstate the hall after being fixed so that it would be used for production and assembly. Huge effort clearing stored sporting gear and cleaning after minimal use in three years. Interior painting working bees made it a much more usable space. This year we have also enjoyed connecting tamariki from the local preschool preparing to start at school. Having this connection has made first days at school run smoothly for students. We have been well equipped to support pre-schoolers starting school and support them through that step. We now have our new parents morning tea each term, a space to meet one another, build relationships and allow parents and caregivers to ask questions as well as see how they can be involved. The end of year was busy with Pasifika Maori Celebration with a hangi and cooking with tamariki and then an all school kapahaka performance. A fun fair was held in not so favourable conditions second to last day of year in rain and wind with barbeque for school, bouncy castle in the hall and inflatables out in the pool, a great fun finish for the term. We are excited for 2022 and seeing ways to support our tamariki and community!





# ORIGIN SPORT

On the back of an unprecedented year in 2020, 2021 once again proved to be a year of change for Origin Sport, but it still proved to be a very successful in engaging our local communities in physical activity. Overall, a total of 32,432 participations occurred in 2021 which was close to a 25% increase from 2020 & approximately 4,000 more than our 2019 figures.

One of the most exciting new initiatives that took place in 2021 was the Spring Sports Module at Hoon Hay Park. It proved so successful it continued into the summer months. Kī-o-Rahi & Tag Football were the 2 sports codes that we provided, at no cost to tamariki & rangatahi, for 14 straight weeks. This was made possible thanks to some start up costs being covered by Sport Canterbury, support from the Rowley Resource Centre and leveraging our existing relationships with both Canterbury Tag & Kī-o-Rahi ki Waitaha.

Term 1 saw the launch of Surfing trips to Scarborough Beach for a group of students from Te Kōmanawa Rowley School. These children all had no Surfing experience but through assistance from Roy, Jeremy, & an external provider, they were able to catch and ride waves in as little as their two attempts! As a result of the feedback that we received from the participants this project is coming back bigger & better in 2022 along with a Surfboard library run out of Roy's garage.



The long-standing relationships with Addington, Te Kōmanawa Rowley, Te Ara Koropiko West Spreydon & Hoon Hay schools continued but different approaches were taken at each of these schools depending on their needs & the desires of their staff. Co-curricular physical literacy sessions, coaching school teams, running lunch time activities & 40 weeks of an afterschool programme (Te Kōmanawa Rowley School) occurred.

Our Junior Touch module at Centennial Park remained strong. 120 team entries were received across the 2 Terms of play. Volunteer referee numbers saw growth & many have now been helping for 3 or more seasons.

The collaboration with the Special Friends Sports Trust on the Tamariki Matatoa pilot project rolled on in 2021. The number of children, in foster or residential care, paired with an adult mentor to help make sporting opportunities more accessible increased from 10 to 20. Origin's role was the fortnightly community-based sessions which included Track Cycling, Disc Golf, Mau rākau, Table Tennis and a visit to Canterbury Rugby's headquarters. Many of the participants have achieved the shared goal of joining a community-based sports club and have been replaced in the programme by another child seeking a chance to find their niche.

The one negative from 2021 was the decline in numbers attending our Sports Week Holiday programme. It continued to be run out of the Kereru Sports & Cultural Club whilst Te Ara Koropiko West Spreydon School was being redeveloped & then had compliances issues with their school hall. Whether the drop in numbers was due to the change of venue or a result of more parents having the ability to work from home during Covid is yet to be determined but it is one project that is currently being reassessed.

# INTERNS

Michael Pule and Jeremy Chee finished the third year of their internship and Youth Work Development Degree in 2021! Congratulations to them both for all they have done in their studies and our local communities during the past three years! You have been a significant part of the team!

Michael and Jeremy are present at lunchtime and after school and are always helping out at community events. This year Jeremy coached Rowley touch rugby team to the final championships, where they came first in the tournament! Both Michael and Jeremy helped with surf lessons in the summer seasons, where they have been encouraging and teaching tamariki beach education.

They help students set up and pack down games such as tug of war at lunchtime. It has been great seeing students take part in these activities!

Michael and Jeremy journeyed alongside our young people helping run a youth group and attending Easter Camp. They are known in the community and are a massive support for our young people. They have prepared many hangis over the year of 2021 for many different events.

We have seen them encourage the community and empower young people. We thank them again for what they have brought to the team and community this year, and we look forward to seeing the next part of the journey now they have finished their Bachelor in Youth Work Development!





# THE ORCHARD

The Orchard is a project that is umbrellaed by Cross Over Trust. This space is located at the Rowley Shops for young people and whanau to learn and develop their skills in art and music. With the support from Mark Vanilau and Solomon Smith, who oversee this project, young people in the community have developed their talents as well as attended live music concerts, and even performed at 'The Great Hall' at the Christchurch Arts Centre in 2021. There are young people in our community with great talent, and it has been good to see them grow in confidence and have opportunities to share their talent. We are grateful for the funding that contributes to this project included Rata Foundations crowdfunded 'Boosted Arts' campaign. We are also thankful for the support from the community and the enthusiasm of our young people, and it is great to see the uptake and engagement in The Orchard Project.

## SOCIAL ENTERPRISE

In 2020 in response to Covid-19, Cross Over Trust decided to put our Social Enterprise 'caring campers' on hold while the borders were closed to non-residents in Aotearoa. In reflection, this was the best decision for our Social Enterprise. While this has decreased income, we were grateful for a large donation made to the Trust in 2021. Most people hiring or purchasing campervans in our experience are from overseas, so this had a significant impact on our decision as to when we will continue this venture. 'Caring Campers' gives us revenue to support and work in our local communities and as we begin 2022, we will be adaptable and proactive when the opportunity arises for 'caring campers' to resume. While pausing had an impact on our financial position, the Trust is secure due to the support of our funders and donation base allowing us to continue to serve young people in our communities.

We know that we need to be adaptable in the way we work in the future, ensuring we are supporting our communities in the best ways possible. We are looking forward to what the year 2022 will look like for our young people as we continue to serve and listen to their needs. We are committed to our mission 'Growing Resilient Children and Youth of Character' and 'Thriving Woven Communities' vision.

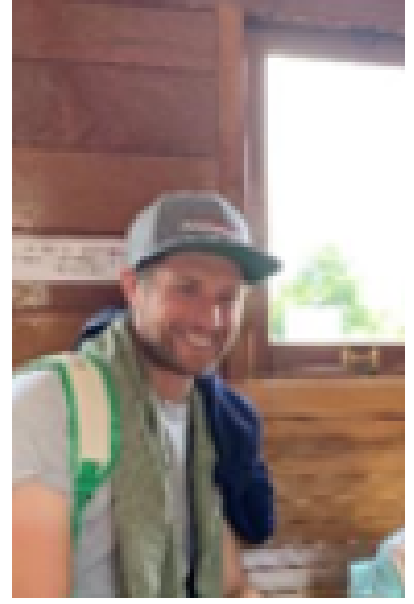

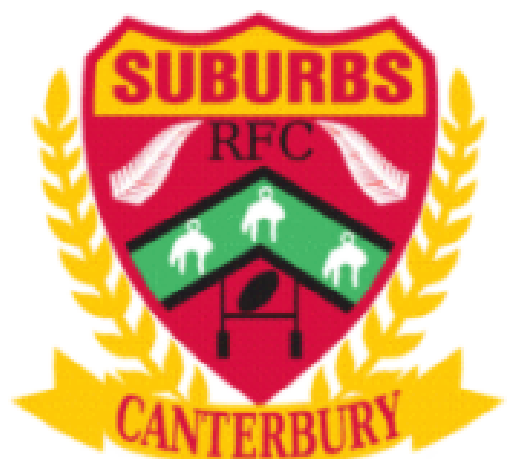
